About the Organisation

The Victorian Aboriginal Health Service (VAHS) was established in 1973 to address the specific medical needs of Victorian Aboriginal communities. 2023 marked a landmark year as VAHS proudly celebrated its 50-year of providing a comprehensive range of medical, dental, allied health and social services for our community.

As well as providing a variety of medical services, VAHS is committed to supporting the wellbeing of the community through contributions to community events and activities. VAHS is also committed to assisting research into the ongoing needs of the community.

VAHS is a child safe organisation, committed to child safety and wellbeing, and recruits' staff in accordance with the Child Safe Standards Victoria.

About the Opportunity

In this role, you will evaluate, diagnose, and treat children that may have mild or severe mental, social, or emotional health disorders.

You will apply practical strategies to improve relationships, behaviour, support children affected by family challenges, as well as those struggling to manage their emotions, navigate friendships, and develop healthy self-esteem.

Key Responsibilities

The role involves providing holistic, evidence-based psychological support to children and adolescents facing psychological, developmental, and emotional challenges. Responsibilities include conducting culturally appropriate assessments, developing treatment plans, educating families on effective interventions, and ensuring compliance with funding and requirements. The position also involves addressing issues such as depression, bullying, mental health concerns, and learning difficulties. Collaboration with Aboriginal health workers and multi-disciplinary teams is essential, along with maintaining accurate and professional clinical documentation.

Key Selection Criteria

To be considered for this role you must have the following:

Essential:

- The capability and engagement to understand the philosophy and principles of Aboriginal Community Control and transforming it into practice.
- Demonstrated capability to achieve the key responsibilities
- Demonstrated commitment to Health, Safety and Wellbeing of self and others and Child Safety.

- Knowledge of different therapeutic methods and the ability to switch between different approaches to meet each child's needs.
- Empathic quality in addressing the emotional needs of children.
- Confidence working in age-appropriate, fun, and engaging ways with children.
- Outstanding problem solving and critical thinking skills.
- Excellent communication skills, specifically the ability to communicate with children of different ages and their family.
- Ability to manage a caseload with a variety of presenting difficulties.

Desirable:

- Excellent case management skills to include advocacy, assessment, development, and implementation of tailored case plans.
- Knowledge and understanding of the effect of trans-generational trauma on Aboriginal youth and their families.
- Demonstrated experience in work with Aboriginal Youth.
- Strong communication, advocacy and written skills demonstrate a capacity to negotiate and communicate with a wide range of professionals and individuals.
- Proven ability to perform duties without direct supervision.
