About the Organisation

About the Opportunity

The role of the Therapeutic Practitioner is to develop and provide comprehensive therapeutic intervention services to individuals and families who are affected by a range of presenting issue post family violence.

Key responsibilities

The role involves conducting comprehensive intake, risk assessments, and safety planning, as well as providing evidence-based short to medium-term counseling for family violence victim survivors, including children, young people, and adults. Responsibilities include facilitating trauma-informed therapeutic groups, offering brief case management, and maintaining a caseload with individual and family therapeutic work, including case documentation and reporting. Collaboration with partner organizations, staying informed about policies, and contributing to service improvements are key aspects. The role also involves creating culturally appropriate plans with relevant agencies and engaging in regular supervision and reflective practice.

Key Selection Criteria

To be considered for this role you must have the following:

- The capability and engagement to understand the philosophy and principles of Aboriginal Community Control and transforming it into practice.
- Knowledge and understanding of trauma, child development and family dynamics.
- Knowledge of information sharing in the context of family violence provisions and
- the child information sharing scheme, aligning with the MARAM Framework
- Ability to conduct comprehensive screening and risk assessments and risk planning
- for family violence victim survivors.
- Experience with planning and leading evidence-based therapeutic programs for
- individuals and groups.

- Skills and experience relevant to Recommendation 209 requirements.
- Tertiary Qualifications in Social Work, Psychology, Counselling, or other relevant
- Human Services qualification and/or experience.
- Demonstrated commitment to Health, Safety and Wellbeing of self and others and
- Child Safety
